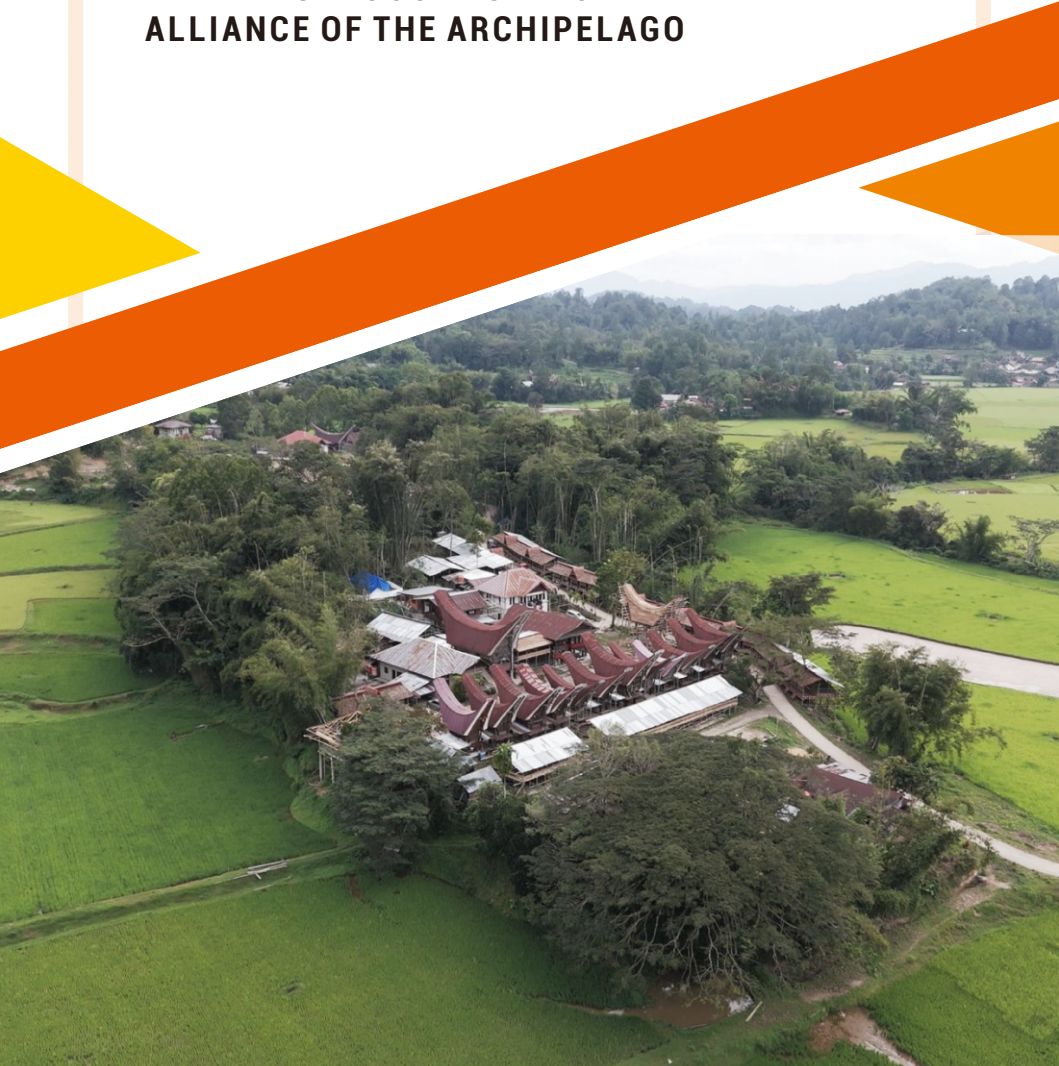

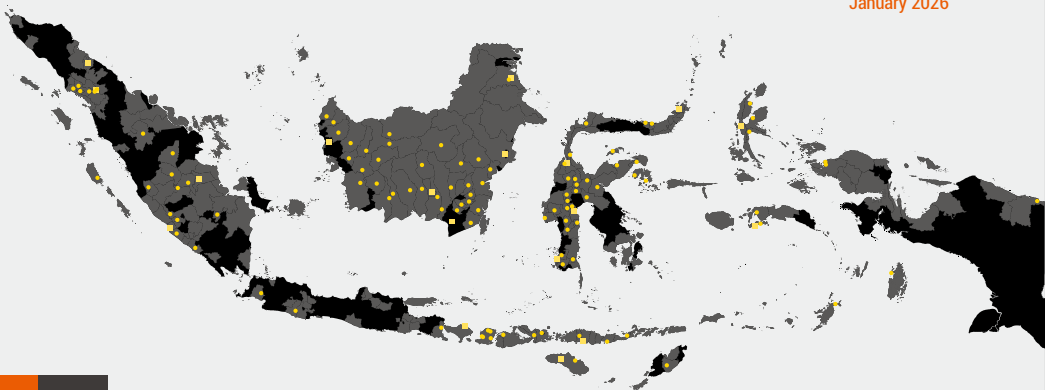
WHO WE ARE

The Indigenous Peoples Alliance of the Archipelago (AMAN) established on 17 March 1999. We consist of: 2,649 member communities; + 21 million in population, 21 Regional Chapters, 113 Local Chapters, 4 Wing Organizations, 2 Autonomous Bodies, 3 Economic Institutions. AMAN members and chapters represent in 33 provinces in Indonesia, which is in 7 regions: Sumatera, Kalimantan, Java, Sulawesi, Bali-Nusra Tenggara, Maluku and Papua. AMAN HQ: 58 staffs; Regional Chapters: 126(6 staffs x 21 RCs); Local Chapters: 452 staffs (4 staffs x 113 LCs). Total staffs 636. HQ staffs + 10% of field-based staffs

OUR VISION

AMAN's vision is to realize a just and prosperous life of Indigenous Peoples. Our mission is to empower, advocate for and mobilize Indigenous Peoples to protect their collective rights and to preserve their cultures and environments for current and future generations. Our works provides innovative solutions by utilizing indigenous values, knowledge and solidarity to promote social justice, ecological sustainability and human welfare.

In an era of challenges including poverty, climate change and conflict, our strategy is the protection of the rights of Indigenous Peoples, including territories with high carbon forest and biodiversity ecosystems by advancing current national and local policies, while enhancing livelihood with low carbon lifestyle, culture, and traditional knowledge, strengthening collective actions that contribute directly to reduced emissions, enhanced carbon stocks, biodiversity protection, thriving local economy, and resilience.

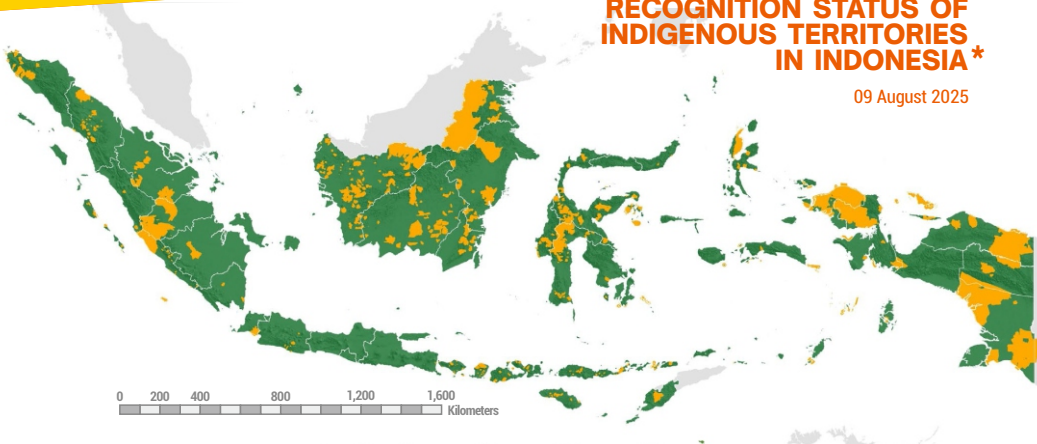


WHAT WE DO

Together with our partners, by August 2025, we have mapped of 33,6 million hectares Indigenous territories from 1,633 indigenous communities, with coverage of 24,593,240 hectares of forest. Of the total area mapped, 6,372,307 million ha has recognized by local governments. AMAN has calculated a 42 million hectares indicative map of indigenous territories with 21,073 Mt C.

WHAT WE DO

- AMAN Policy interventions at the national and local level resulted in Amendment of Indonesia Constitution 1945, Law No. 27/2007 on Coastal Areas and Small Island, Law No. 32/2009 on Management and Protection of Environment, Constitutional Court No. 35/2012 on Customary Forest, Permendagri 52/2014 on Guidelines for Recognition and Protection of Indigenous Peoples, Permen ATR No.14/2024 Concerning Land Administration And Registration of Customary Land Rights For Indigenous Peoples, TAP MPR No. IX/2001 on Agrarian Reform and Management of Natural Resources, Draft Bill on Indigenous Peoples, 366 Local Policies on Indigenous Peoples, National Inquiry concerning Violations of Indigenous Land Rights in Forest Areas conducted by the National Commission on Human Rights.
- Strengthening Indigenous Peoples' Political Participation, resulted in numbers of Indigenous politicians: 12 Indigenous Parliamentarians and 569 Head of Villages.

- **Strengthening Indigenous Economy, Renewable Energy, and Food Sovereignty:** 48 Indigenous Peoples-Owned Enterprises (Badan Usaha Milik Masyarakat Adat-BUMMA) established and running with 415 Indigenous Peoples' Economic Group (agriculture, plantations, livestock, fisheries and craft) in community level, including 65 initiated and led by indigenous youth and 98 initiated and led by indigenous women. 188 communities have potential renewable energy resources.
- **Strengthening Indigenous Education and Traditional Knowledge:** 132 Indigenous Schools initiated and led by Indigenous youth; 857 communities data documented, 250 among them collected and documented by youth.
- **Emergency Response** has been in place since 2012 and established 108 community level Emergency Response Units.
- **At the international level,** AMAN has been involved in initiation of various global initiatives including the Global Alliance of Territorial Communities (GATC); The International Indigenous Peoples Forum on Climate Change/IPFCC; the FIP's Dedicated Grant Mechanism, an innovative grant program of USD 80 million for fighting forest loss by putting project design and funding decisions in the hands of Indigenous Peoples and Local Communities (IPLCs) in 13 countries in Asia, Africa, and Latin America. AMAN is also a member of the Asia Indigenous Peoples Pact (AIPP), an Asia regional based Indigenous Peoples coordinating Organization.



- Establishment of Nusantara Fund and IPAS (Indigenous Peoples of Asia Solidarity) Fund. Together with Consortium for Agrarian Reform (KPA) and WALHI (Friends of The Earth Indonesia), AMAN established the Dana Nusantara or Nusantara Fund, a direct funding mechanism and trust/endowment fund for Indigenous Peoples and Local Communities in Indonesia, launched in 8 May 2023 in Jakarta. At the same year, together with 26 IPs Organisations in Asia, we established the Indigenous Peoples of Asia Solidarity (IPAS) Fund for Asia Indigenous Peoples, with AMAN as the host organization.
- Establishing Lembur Nusantara, a center for Nusantara Indigenous Peoples empowerment. Lembur Nusantara is a place for growth & fluorescence for Indigenous Peoples. A home for education on survival & durability to re-seize our rights, to act determinations considering the dialectics within the very principles issues on humanity, nature environment, and globalization.

OUR TARGETS

Our strategy will impact at least 20 million Indigenous Peoples in Indonesia and 40 million Ha of indigenous territories through:

1. Recognition and protection of the rights of Indigenous Peoples at the local and national level, including the adoption of the pending Law on Indigenous Peoples.
2. 40 million hectares indigenous territories mapped and registered by 2030.
3. Rehabilitation of at least 15 million hectares degraded indigenous territories by 2030.
4. Community food sovereignty, economic resilient and renewable energy, including developing roadmap to and promotes organic farming, developing Indigenous Peoples economic model, establishing Community-Owned Business Enterprises, building access to market and network, building access to community renewable energy.



OUR TARGETS

5. 5 million Hectares Organic Farming-Based Conservation developed and led by youth and women.
6. Ensuring transmission of traditional knowledge by establishing and strengthening 100 Indigenous Schools and Indigenous Education Center.
7. Strengthening indigenous governance system, institution and leadership (elders, women, and youth).
8. Establishing and strengthening Indigenous Peoples and Local Communities' own Direct Funding Mechanism.
